**SECOND READING 1 Peter 1: 3 - 9**

**A reading from the first letter of St. Peter.**

Blessed be God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who in his great mercy has given us a new birth as his sons, by raising Jesus Christ from the dead, so that we have a sure hope and the promise of an inheritance that can never be spoilt or soiled and never fade away, because it is being kept for you in the heavens. Through your faith, God's power will guard you until the salvation which has been prepared is revealed at the end of time. This is a cause of great joy for you, even though you may for a short time have to bear being plagued by all sorts of trials; so that, when Jesus Christ is revealed, your faith will have been tested and proved like gold - only it is more precious than gold, which is corruptible even though it bears testing by fire - and then you will have praise and glory and honour. You did not see him, yet you love him; and still without seeing him, you are already filled with a joy so glorious that it cannot be described, because you believe; and you are sure of the end to which your faith looks forward, that is, the salvation of your souls.

**GOSPEL ACCLAMATION**

**GOSPEL John 20:19-31**

**A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.**

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.'

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit.'

For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them.



**Easter for Thomas was a rediscovery of his faith in Jesus. The risen power of the Lord is the basis for his people's faith.**

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

**I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord,**

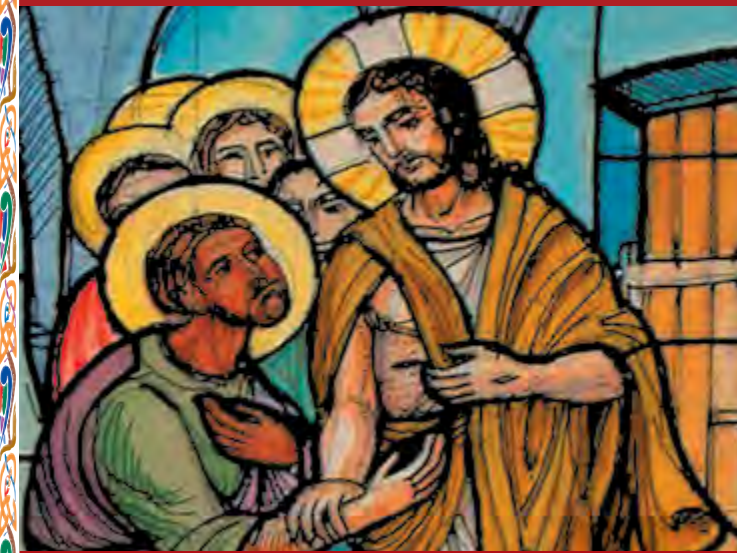

**AFTER THE CONSECRATION**

**The mystery of faith. When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again.**



Doors were closed – this is a big image from the gospel today. We often close our doors from fear, or in anger. We close the door for warmth. We shut the door of our heart to someone dear or not so dear, who has offended us, and sometimes not even 'sorry' opens the door.

The door of the room where the new community of Jesus lived after his death was closed through fear. The fear that some of the Jews might come to torture them. They must have wondered during that time how they might open the door and live their lives again. Or maybe they wondered 'will he come back as he said he would?' I can imagine Mary, their new mother, now the mother of the church, reminding them to keep faith that he would come back.

We know that he did. Eight days later, it says, he came through the door. This statement means that he came through their fears, and they need fear no more. He encouraged them to deepen faith and to bring his message of forgiveness to their people. The church was being born, again with the help of Mary.

People today suffer much from anxiety. Sometimes it's a sort of free-floating anxiety. All ages are prone to it. The anxiety door is gently opened forever by the love of the risen Lord and the message that he has conquered the worst fears of all – torture, violence and death. In any way we can help people in the anxiety of our age we are opening the doors as Jesus did for the new community.

**Risen Lord, give us the love in which our anxiety will fade away.**

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
